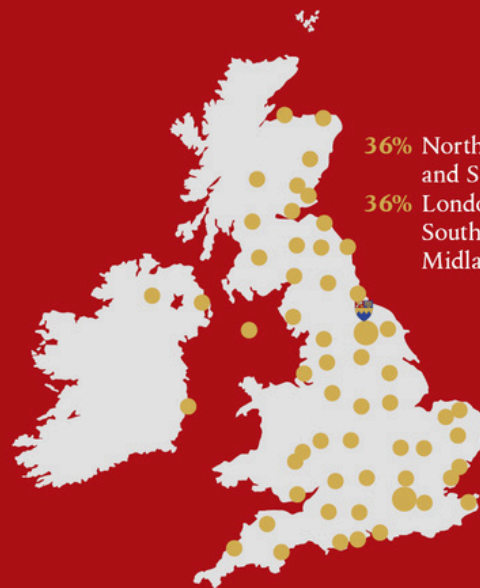

Modern Languages

Department

The department offers French, Spanish and German at both GCSE and A-Level. Languages are a very popular subject and some of our students are choosing two languages at GCSE. In Year 7 and year 8, all students study French and in year 9 the vast majority study French and either Spanish or German at beginner level.

In French, we follow the Edexcel board for GCSE and AQA syllabus at A level. We design our own high-quality resources rooted in the latest educational research, active teaching, purposeful modelling, and Conti's methods of retrieval and fluency. Due to our classes being relatively small, we can truly tailor our support and challenge every student. At Ampleforth, we want our students to become independent in their use of language and we encourage them to use their linguistic skills creatively and actively. All our A level students enjoy a weekly individual one to one lesson with our French teachers in addition to their timetabled contact hours. Our lessons at KS3 are lively and fun and we have been experimenting more recently with the phonics approach.

From year 9, all our students are issued with an IPAD and MFL teachers are using TEAMS to set homework and to share teaching material and resources.

We take every opportunity to bring the language to the classroom with a wide range of French media, visits to the cinema or university language focused days, participation in the regional MFL debating competition, theatre visits and entries to the Oxford flash writing competitions as well as entries to the Linguistic Olympiads.

In the MFL department, we are a group of skilled like-minded linguists with a passion for our subject and where we actively collaborate with one another. You will often hear us speaking our respective languages with one another around school. We are determined to share new pedagogical methods and perspectives in teaching and learning MFL and would welcome a new colleague who would be willing to explore this with us.



MFL Round Up 2026

The languages department has experienced another exceptionally busy year. Alongside delivering an engaging and rigorous curriculum, we have worked to enrich the learning experience by integrating technology and authentic materials into our lively lessons. We also continued to offer specialized speaking support and coaching. Furthermore, our students benefited from numerous curriculum-enhancing opportunities that truly brought their language studies to life.

We have continued to provide our students with opportunities to showcase their skills in various competitions and events. In November, a group of Year 12 students—Alice, Victoria, Katelyn, Emily, and Daniyal—took part in the UK Linguistics Olympiad. This year, they tackled challenging tasks featuring languages such as Seri, Iñupiaq, Lezgian, Khana, and Cantonese Braille. It proved to be a highly enriching and enjoyable experience for everyone involved. Similarly, the Linguistic Society provides a weekly activity open to years 7 and 8. During the sessions, students solved language puzzles and explored amazing cultural facts about linguistics. They learned about the deep influences of Latin, Greek, Norse, and Celtic on the ways we speak. They also dove into the world of codes, cryptography, secret and made-up languages. To wrap up a fantastic year, the students even tried their hands at creating their very own language!

The Year 7 and Year 8 students enjoyed a session focused on how learning a language gives us new ways to express ourselves and helps us tell different stories. For the Year 9 students, Dr Summers showed how languages give you great skills for any future job, focusing on creativity and decoding patterns. The Year 9 students then put these skills to the test by decoding a Swedish poem.

On 12th November, our KS3 students took part in an exciting Language Day. We welcomed Dr Caroline Summers from Warwick University, who came to give an inspiring talk called 'The Power of Languages'.

From 17th to 21st November, our Year 9 students took part in a thrilling national language competition designed by GCHQ, the UK's intelligence service. This special contest aims to get young people excited about languages. It does not require any previous language knowledge because it focuses on solving puzzles of all different difficulty levels.

Ampleforth College was proudly represented by Ellie, Mary, Max, and Maria. Operating under the team's name "Receptive Rattlesnake," the students used their own chosen secret agent names: Alert Intriguing Duck, Intelligent Super Bear, Compassionate Rapid Starfish, and Royal Loyal Tiger. Together, they fought valiantly and scored an impressive 3,070 points.

In January, our Year 13 Spanish students enjoyed an enriching cultural visit from three Chilean members of the Manquehue group. They gave a fascinating talk and live demonstration on El canto a lo poeta, a beautiful musical and poetic tradition practised for over 400 years.

Students learned that this art features cantores (singers) who perform complex verses from memory. They accompany themselves on a standard guitar or a traditional, multi-stringed guitarrón chileno. Deeply rooted in local communities, the tradition is split into two primary branches. The first is Canto a lo Divino, which features sacred poetry about biblical stories and saints sung during religious vigils and rural festivals. The second is Canto a lo Humano, which covers secular themes like love, history, and social commentary. It even includes fun, improvised singing battles called payas.

The Lent term saw an exciting mix of science, space, and deep thinking for our linguists.

First, in January, a team of years 10 & 11 students visited the RAF base in Leeming for the International Space Challenge. It involved the design of a practical space hotel for a European company. The twist? They had to work with foreign materials suppliers and pitch their ideas to investors in French, German, or Spanish! It was a brilliant, fun way to use science and languages together while building great skills for future jobs.

Around the same time, our Academic Scholars enjoyed two fascinating talks. They explored big ideas in 'Language and Culture' and 'Universal Grammar and Language', looking deep into how human speech develops.

Our Sixth Form linguists explored big questions about global culture, history, and politics through their Independent Research Projects, diving far beyond standard textbooks.

In the French department, pupils debated the impact of the 2024 Paris Olympics, the future of French cinema, the law on secularism, and Paris's changing food scene.

Spanish students tackled complex social issues, exploring Argentina's El Gauchito Gil folk culture, Mexico's "los muxes" third gender, wealth gaps in Madrid, the commercialism of the St. James' Way, Peru's environmental crisis, and peace in the Basque Country.

Russian students investigated the New Year movie *The Irony of Fate*, Maya Plisetskaya's impact on ballet, Pavel Durov's influence on social media, and tourism threats to Lake Baikal. Whilst the Chinese speakers weighed up the future of overseas students and the role of Artificial Intelligence in education. Finally, German students analysed the Alpine region, the rise of the AfD party, social networks in action, and cannabis legalisation; with our Italian speaker investigating the role of mafia informant Tommaso Buscetta. Needless to say, we are incredibly proud of our Sixth Formers, who proved that learning a language is truly about understanding the world.

Our final big event has been the French exchange, a new exciting venture involving the GCSE French students. In March, eight year 10 students and two staff members visited our partner school in Versailles, St Joseph de Lys.

Staying with French host families gave our pupils a genuine taste of everyday life in France. They attended morning school lessons and spent their afternoons exploring famous sights. Unforgettable highlights included a scenic boat tour along the Seine, witnessing the Crown of Thorns procession at Notre-Dame, and taking part in the moving "Flame of the Nation" ceremony beneath the Arc de Triomphe. They also loved visiting the magnificent Palace of Versailles and, of course, eating plenty of delicious crêpes!

We then welcomed the French students into our Valley at the start of June. They enjoyed a busy programme of visits to local attractions and participated fully in the daily life of the College. This has been a fabulous experience for everyone involved, creating long-lasting memories and friendships!

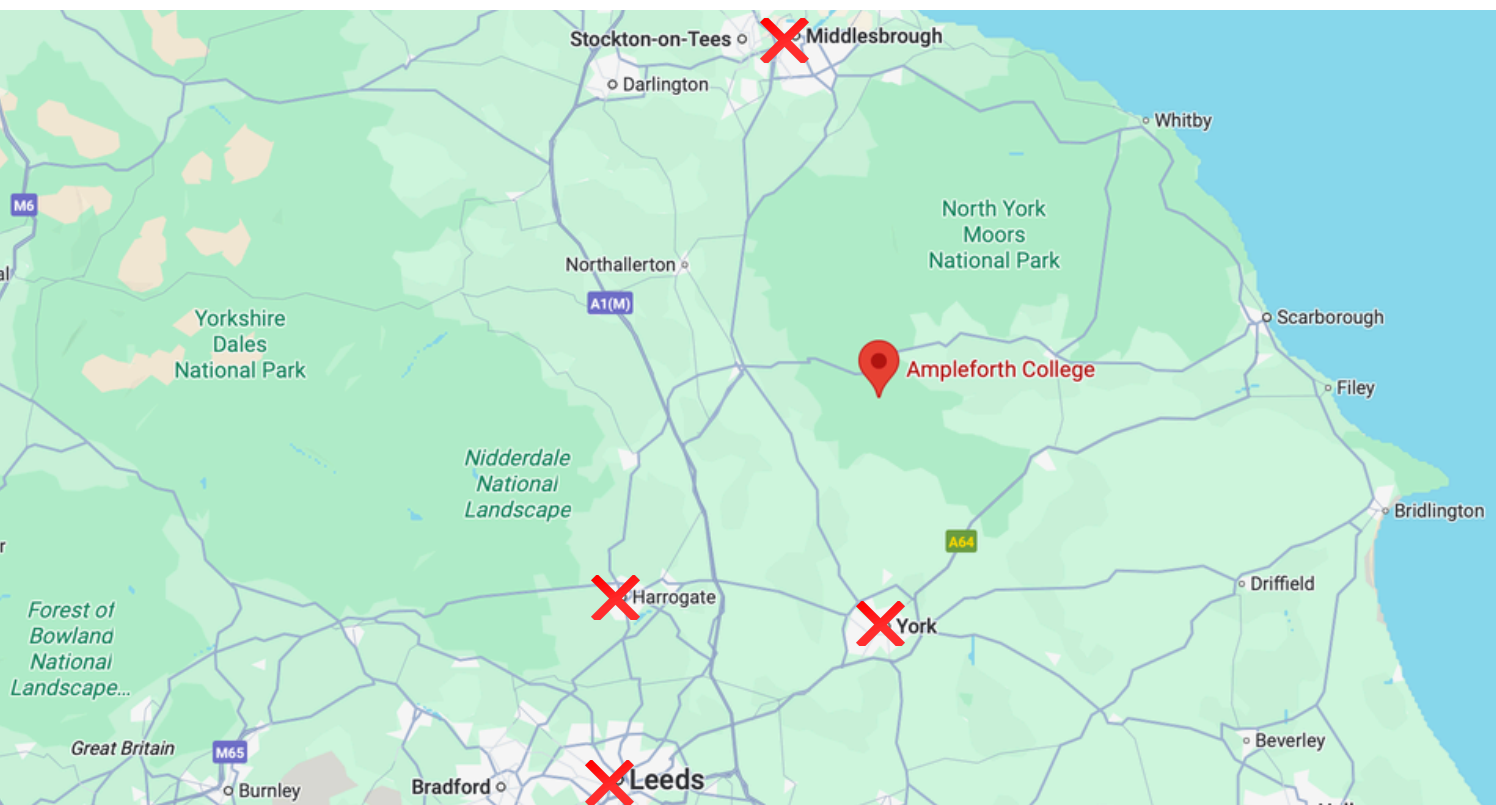
